

Introduction

- 1** The Task Force is a group that came together in the Summer of 2023 to identify policy elements that should be implemented in order to create a safe church environment.
- 2** The "church" is nameless with ministers known as "workers" and the church members as people who are "professing", and together they make up "the friends". The ministers go two-by-two in defined "fields", and are homeless with few possessions, relying on open homes in the field to stay at for a few nights at a time, except where impractical such as in foreign lands where they may have a bach. Sunday AM fellowship meetings and Wednesday night bible studies are held in the home, weekly Gospel Meetings and Special Meetings are usually held in rented spaces, and annual Conventions are held regionally, usually in rural spaces owned by some of the friends but also in rented spaces. The fellowship is known by some as The Truth or 2X2s,
- 3** The Task Force Mission is: Develop framework for an effective, CSA/SA policy and begin to work collaboratively towards implementation. Our work product can a) Assist efforts to develop Safe Church policies; b) be used as a benchmark for assessing the adequacy of church policies (for example, by scoring as noted in #7 below).
- 4** The Task Force identified that two separate policies are needed:
 - 1) Safe Church Policy - this policy would be administered by the church members (ie, not the ministry)
 - 2) Safe Ministry Policy - this policy would be administered by the ministry, with transparency to the church
- 5** "Essential" policy elements are those that the Task Force feels must be in a Safe Church policy.
- 6** "Best Practice" policy elements are those that the Task Force feels would be in an ideal Safe Church policy.
- 7** To "score" a Safe Church Policy or a Safe Ministry Handbook against our findings, simply use Column E in each of the respective worksheets and note using a 1 or a 0 if that element exists or doesn't exist in the policy. Then, tally the totals and quantitatively compare, for example stating that a certain Safe Church policy has X of the 42 Best Practice elements, Y of the Negative elements, and that a Ministry Handbook has Z of the 24 Best Practice elements.
